


# History

Finnish history consists of three eras:

- A part of Sweden **1150 – 1809**
- Autonomous Grand Duchy within Russia Empire **1809 - 1917**
- Republic of Finland from **1917** onwards





# History


- Helsinki was founded by Swedish king Gustav Vasa in **1550**
- The King ordered the burghers of Rauma, Ulvila, Porvoo and Tammisaari to move to Helsinki **12.6.1550**
- In **1640** Helsinki was moved from it's original location at the mouth of river Vantaa to south towards Vironniemi headland (today's Kruunuhaka)
- Helsinki was proclaimed the capital of Finland in **1812**





# History

- **1917** Finland gains independence
- **1952** Finland hosts Olympics
- The first U.S.-Soviet summit took place in Helsinki in **1990**
- Helsinki was one of the nine European Cities of Culture for the year **2000**
- Helsinki was chosen as the World Design Capital for **2012**





# Geography

- Helsinki is spread across a number of bays and peninsulas and over a number of islands
- The inner city area occupies a southern peninsula - Vironniemi
- Major Islands in Helsinki include Seurasaari, Lauttasaari and Korkeasaari (where Helsinki ZOO is located)





# Geography

- The Sea Fortress - Suomenlinna (Sveaborg) is located on six islands that belong to Helsinki
- Suomenlinna is a UNESCO World Heritage Site





# Geography

- Helsinki has a humid continental climate
- Average yearly temperature +5.9°C
- Average July temperature: +17.2°C
- Average February temperature: -4.8°C





# Demographics

- Helsinki population is 596 233 inhabitants
- Proportion of women 53,4%
- Life expectancy 75,1 for men and 81,7 for women
- Foreign citizens make up 5,2% of the population
- The largest foreigners groups come from Estonia (5,900), Russia (5,633), Somalia (2,400), China (1,150) and Thailand (680)






# Languages

**Two official languages:**

- Finnish 94%
- Swedish 6% (Swedish was the sole administrative language until 1902 as well as the dominant language of culture and education until Finnish independence in 1917)



- English 63%
- German 18%
- French 3%





# Finnish language

- Finnish belongs to the Finnic group of the Finno-Ugric family of languages
- There are two main varieties of Finnish:
  - standard language (*yleiskieli*)
  - spoken language (*puhekieli*)
- Finnish is a synthetic and an agglutinative language.





# Some useful tips

- Don't try to greet a Finn with kisses! Finns shake hands and make eye contact. Handshakes are brief and firm, and involve no supporting gestures.
- The Finns are polite and respectful. They wait and stay at line with patience everywhere and in every situation, and wait for green at the light for cross over.
- Don't talk too much or express feelings in public. Finns place great value on words, which is reflected in the tendency to say little and avoid 'unnecessary' small talk. They are better at listening than at talking.


